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
Quarterly Update for January 2022

Health Administration

- New Health and social development director
- Five-year evaluation has been reviewed by Chief and Council
 - Evaluation, in other communities, is ongoing
- Ten-year Community Health Plan
 - 12 interviews 1 on 1, done in community, on team, or over the phone
 - 13 focus groups were done with staff about programs and services
 - 12 focus groups done with community members about programs and services
 - Document being written at the moment
 - New date extension March 2023
- Accreditation renewal postponed
 - New date is January 2023 for extension
 - Beginning stages of yearlong progress

COVID update

- 499 Covid vaccines administered
- Approximate 80% vaccination rate for community members
- Both vaccinated and unvaccinated people are getting Covid
- 11-15 positive cases this quarterly
- 3 families currently isolating
- 3 people went to hospital.
- One possible exposure at the recovery home
- 13 families were supported with food and/or accommodation through the Health teams



COVID update continued

- Testing available for people with high barriers to accessing testing through Fraser Health
- Both doctors and three nurses are doing COVID-19 testing
- Rapid testing machine in the works
- Care kits for families on isolation delivered
- Health team liaise with Fraser Health and First Nations Health Authority to ensure all supports are in place for families with Covid.

Income Assistance

- 113 open files
- Supported 3 families with funerals

Traditional Food Bank

50 families supported this quarterly

Food and Christmas Gift Donation

 Sikh community donated to Seabird. During the floods to supported us with 3 deliveries, working closely with our income assistance team.

45-50 clients monthly

Employment Readiness

650 monthly visits with clients

Driver Education Starting Again Soon

 Staff member set to take training in January










Health promotion

Community Gym/Mobility Program

- Twice a week service from physio/kinesiology
- 6-8 clients from Seabird; home visits
- 650 monthly visits with clients

Maternal Child Health

- 9 new babies this quarterly
- 111 clients and 80-100 visits per month
- We are losing one midwife and working on finding another one
- Prenatal class "Sacred seed" being done monthly
- Bodies in motion done over zoom monthly
- Sisele story time new book read by staff on zoom













Medical Clinic

2 First Nations Doctors

 One doctor in practicum shadowing Dr. Fox

Over 3800 Patients

• 60 -70% telephone visits

Obstetrician will be resuming later in the fall

Dental Clinic

- 2400 clients
- Running at about 55-60% due to weather complication
- New fulltime CDA
- Excellence in Covid protocols



Child and Family Services: Capital Project

- Create office space, meeting rooms, and program spaces for Child and Family services
- Collaborating for the cultural/youth facility
- Hope to co-locate these spaces with cultural programs/youth programs/elder programs

Family Development

- 10 workers providing intensive and ongoing support for Seabird families (68 families)
 - Cultural support (out for spirit bath and sweat)
 - Food and basic needs
 - Life skills
 - Youth outreach, Family reunification and family care plan
 - Safety, Harm reduction, Addictions
 - Referrals, justice advocacy, advocation, resource navigation, goal setting
 - Women's group (summer), Men's group (summer), Support group being planned
- Collaborating with Housing, education of our youth and income assistants.
- Hired a new Family development supervisor and family development for justice advocate







Child Protection

- Monthly case management meetings with MCFD
- Monthly case management meetings with Xyolhemeylh
- Monthly strategic planning for Seabird jurisdiction over child protection
- Maggie Pettis: Child advocate/Band Rep
- Statistics: MCFD
 - 19 family service files
 - 12 child service files
 - 4 youth agreements







Mental HealthRecovery Homes

- New Ayelexw supervisor
- Decreased capacity for Covid protocols
- Averaging 8 clients per home
- Averaging 6
 applications per month

UFV Student Placement Agreement

- Social work program
- Teaching clinic; 2
 students quarterly one
 placed in the trauma
 home and one placed in
 the recovery homes
- Many students are hired!

Family Home

- Four families have a stable and safe place to grow
- New garden at the family home


Land Based Trauma Healing House

- Agassiz house purchased for long term investment
- Agassiz house is used for this program
- \$400,000 for operating costs
- Intensive, group-based, trauma healing
- Cultural and on the Land/territory
- Had one men's group and female group already
- One group has built a sweat lodge.
- 10 more planned for the rest of 2022









Elders Program

- Consultations and phone calls
 - Elders newsletter, Annual report, and traditional medicine booklet.
 - Tablets given out to elders
- Christmas gifts, gift cards, hampers, care packages pet food and an elder made Christmas cards that were delivered.
- Activities chair exercises, youth and elders bingo, picture boards, spirit bath with Crystal Chapman
- Still helping tax return, Indian day school, and residential school claims.
 Helping with emergency plans

- Photos converted from black and white to color for elders


